President's Message

You and Your Chapter

I will start by thanking everyone who has served this chapter over the years and the current slate of officers and committee members and chairs. Together we have accomplished a lot and the chapter has grown significantly both in size and quality since its initial formation in 1975. As we head into our 25th year, I think we also owe many thanks to those initial members who had the vision to form this Chapter. I hope they look on the current Texas Chapter with pride knowing it would not have been possible without their willingness to volunteer and serve, for it has been service that has gotten the Chapter this far.

What has the chapter accomplished in the past 25 years? We have hosted both a national AFS meeting and a Southeastern meeting. We have published and updated Texas Farm Ponds: Stocking, Assessment, and Management Recommendations and have pioneered using the internet to disseminate information and distribute publications. We have published a Guide to Urban Fishing that has been a very popular download at the website. We have sponsored college scholarships, special speakers, and have developed our proceedings into peer reviewed literature. We have built new partnerships with other chapters through joint meetings with neighboring states that have allowed us to interact and learn from each other and develop new contacts. We continually have quality presentations at our meetings from a wide

variety of fields within fisheries. We have conducted continuing education sessions that help educate our members about new developments in fisheries or that refresh information learned years ago. We are continuing work to establish student sub-units at Texas Tech and Stephen F. Austin University. Our meetings create the opportunity to network with our peers in our own departments and with other professionals in other departments – state, federal, and private.

That brings me to my next point – have **you** taken the opportunity to serve **your** Chapter since you joined and if not, what is preventing you? Do you perceive that the workload that may come from committee membership may be more than you can handle with your current work or that you feel you are not qualified for the position? Is it that you see active participation as a waste of time, that nothing will be accomplished anyway except for meetings? Or maybe you have signed up for a committee in the past and nobody ever contacted you to help so you say why bother. I would suggest that you don't sit back and let opportunity pass you by. If the committee isn't as active as you would like, volunteer to chair, if the committee has too much going on, recruit new members. The Chapter is only as good as its members.

Everything we have done could not have been accomplished without active participation by members. I encourage you to evaluate your participation in the Chapter and ask yourself "Could I do more?" It doesn't take a commitment of large amounts of time to serve on any committee and you don't have to be an "expert" to serve. Most of the committees and offices only require an hour or two a month or less. As the old adage goes "many hands make light work." The more



people we have participating in committees, the easier the work will be and the more we will be able to do. Active participation gives you the opportunity to learn and experience new things and to make new connections. It is all part of professional development. Next time you have the opportunity to sign up or the nominating committee contacts you, ask yourself if your profession and your personal development are worth the small amount of time requested of you. I think if you honestly evaluate the benefits, your answer will be yes. See you at the annual meeting.

Charlie Munger called the meeting to order at 1:00.

Treasurer’s Report: The current combined assests of the TCAFS are \$42,452.78 with \$33,835.28 in our investments and \$8,617.50 in checking. This is a slight drop from the third quarter due to a downward trend in the Stock Market which as stabilized, with our assets still greater than they were at this time last year. Expenses for this quarter total \$330.30 for postage and stationary for the mailout ballots and invitations to founding members of TCAFS. Income was \$1322.00 and included our annual scholarship check from W.H.A.T. dues and early meeting registrations.

Newsletter: Brian Van Zee: \$0.92 a copy. Mailed out 140 copies and emailed 150 newsletters out to individuals. Robert Mauk is taking over as the Newsletter editor after the December issue.

Proposed Bylaw Changes

During our efforts to include both Texas Tech University and Stephen F. Austin University Student Chapters as Subunits of the Texas Chapter, our bylaws came under review by the Constitutional Consultant of the American Fisheries Society, Joe Margraf. He has suggested that we amend our bylaws to more accurately reflect the current bylaws of the Parent Society and to allow inclusion of the student subunits. The following is the full text of each Section that had changes proposed. Additions to the bylaws are indicated by underline and deletions by strikeout text. Please review these changes as we will be voting on the changes at our annual meeting in San Marcos in January.

Section 4

Officers

The officers of the Chapter shall consist of a President, President-Elect and a Secretary/Treasurer. Elected officers must be members in good standing of the Chapter and the American Fisheries Society.

Officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. The Secretary/Treasurer holds office for a period of two years, but the term of the other officers shall be until the next annual meeting. In case of a vacated position, the Executive Committee shall appoint a qualified replacement to fill an unexpired term. The President-Elect shall automatically ascend to the office of President, at the annual meeting or if the position of President is vacated.

In the event of a cancellation of an annual meeting, the officers and the members of any committees shall continue to serve until the next scheduled meeting.

Section 6

Executive Committee

The executive Committee of the Chapter shall consist of the elected officers, ~~and the Immediate Past President, and President(s) of Student Subunit(s) operating under the auspices of the Chapter.~~ The committee is authorized to act for the Chapter between meetings and to perform appropriate duties and functions. ~~Elected officers must be members in good standing of the Chapter and the American Fisheries Society.~~

Section 9

Voting and Quorum

Decisions at meetings of the Chapter shall be by simple majority, except where a larger majority is in order based on the most recent edition of Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised and for changes to the bylaws as set forth in Section 11. A quorum at any annual meeting for the transaction of official business shall be 20 members.

Section 11

Amendments of the Bylaws

The Bylaws of the Chapter may be amended and approved in accordance with ~~Article VI and VII~~ of the Constitution of the American Fisheries Society. Proposed amendments shall be provided in writing to the membership at least 30 days prior to the vote, and their adoption shall require approval of a 2/3 majority of those present and voting and by Section 9 of these Bylaws.

Last Call for Nominations

Do you know someone who deserves to be recognized for outstanding work in Fisheries? The Texas Chapter AFS awards committee would like to hear about this individual or group. Nominations based on the following criteria should be sent to John Prentice by **December 15, 2000** at:

Each year nominations are solicited for Special Recognition and Outstanding Fisheries Worker of the Year in seven (7) categories: Administration, Culture, Education, Management, Research, Technical Support, and Fisheries Student.

AWARD CRITERIA

Outstanding Fisheries Worker of the Year

- Nominations can be made only by members in good standing.
- The recipient must be a member in good standing.
- The award is based on fisheries-related work accomplished in Texas and can span more than one year.
- The worker may not be on the Awards Committee.

Administration

- 1) Development of innovative management programs, research activities, or facilities that significantly affect fisheries management and conservation on a regional or statewide level.
- 2) Leadership in implementation of regulations or management programs that address regional or statewide fisheries issues.
- 3) Development of new sources of funding for fisheries programs.
- 4) Leadership in the development of public outreach or recognition/award programs.
- 5) Significant and effective promotion of fisheries management and conservation activities on a regional or statewide level.

Culture

- 1) Development of techniques that produce fish more safely, more efficiently, or more economically.
- 2) Development of methods that produce species not formerly cultured.
- 3) Development of procedures that produce more fish.
- 4) Participation in the development of equipment that benefited fish culture.
- 5) Promotion of fish culture.
- 6) Participation in the production of a record number of fish (may be station- or species-specific).

Education

- 1) Development of an innovative approach to fisheries education as illustrated through development of a new or revised course or curriculum.
- 2) Publication of a journal article, extension publication, book, or book chapter that contributed significantly to fisheries education.
- 3) Contribution of notable service in public education programs.
- 4) Development of educational media (software, videotape, slide-tape, etc.) that contributed significantly to fisheries education.
- 5) Outstanding contributions to the profession through service as an officer or other leader of an educational organization ((e.g., the Education Section of the American Fisheries Society).

Management

- 1) Development of management plans or strategies or implementation of management practices (reservoir or pond management plans, pre-impoundment work, habitat work, development of urban fisheries). This would include private water work.
- 2) Education of the public in areas of fishing or fisheries management (conducting fishing clinics, educational programs, contact with various media, development of brochures, newsletters, bulletin boards, fliers, popular articles, etc.).
- 3) Coordination with different agencies (cities, counties, or federal government) or reservoir controlling authorities to develop or implement management strategies.
- 4) Participation in professional scientific organizations in the fisheries field to include offices held, committees served on, or other activities accomplished for the organization.

Research

- 1) Research contribution should add to the understanding of a biological problem or to solving a resource problem.
- 2) Research contribution can be basic, applied, or a combination.
- 3) Research contribution should have been disseminated, in order of importance, in a peer-reviewed journal, non-peer reviewed publication, or an oral presentation.
- 4) Participation in professional and public organizations in the fisheries research field that comment on, advise, or review research activities.
- 5) In order of importance, the nominee's role in a research project should be directing the project or program, establishing the project or program, analyzing data, or conceiving the project or program.
 - c. Involvement in professional organizations, including participation in committees, organizing or moderating a technical session at a professional meeting, or serving in a peer-elected office.
 - d. Academic excellence.
 - e. Merit-based scholarships or grants.
- 5) Honorable mention may be awarded, for recent graduates only (those who have graduated within 12 months after the last Texas Chapter AFS annual meeting), if more than one nominee is considered Outstanding by the Awards Committee members.
- 6) The award will not be made in any year for which no appropriate candidates are nominated.

Technical Support

- 1) Development of new or improved design and/or construction of equipment used in field sampling, culture, lab analyses, etc.
- 2) Participation in some outstanding or unique management, research or culture activities which aided the fisheries profession.
- 3) Participation in education programs for fisheries workers or the public.
- 4) Accomplishments resulting in new or improved techniques or efficiency.

Fisheries Student

- 1) Only Texas Chapter AFS members in good standing can make nominations. All members who have knowledge of student performance or activities are encouraged to make nominations for this award.
- 2) The nominee must be a member in good standing and must be enrolled in, or recently graduated from, a Texas College or University since the last Texas Chapter AFS annual meeting.
- 3) Students can be nominated at any time during their tenure for work spanning single or multiple years, but no later than 12 months after graduation.
- 4) Notable accomplishments by the nominee should include one or more of the following:
 - a. Student research which adds to the understanding, or solution, of a fisheries-related problem. Research can be basic or applied in nature, can involve nongame or game species, and need not be conducted in the State of Texas.
 - b. Dissemination of research results in, in order of importance, a peer-reviewed publication, thesis or dissertation, non-refereed publication, or an oral presentation.

Special Recognition in Fisheries Work

- Nominations can be made only by members in good standing.
- The recipient may or may not be a member.
- The recipient may be an individual or an organization.
- Recognition should be based on fisheries-related work done in the State of Texas, but can span more than one year.
- Work may, but does not have to, fit into the 7 categories listed above.

Remember – Everything about this award and recognition program starts with YOU nominating someone!

CONTINUING EDUCATION

As in the past, continuing education will include multiple classes taught concurrently. Human Dimensions will be taught by T.O. Smith - T.O. is going to give a brief synopsis of his job and then tantalize our brain cells with a provocative presentation on “Valuation of the Aquatic Environment”. Shirley Thompson of Creative Services, Austin HQ, is putting together a presentation on “Audio/visual planning and preparation”. 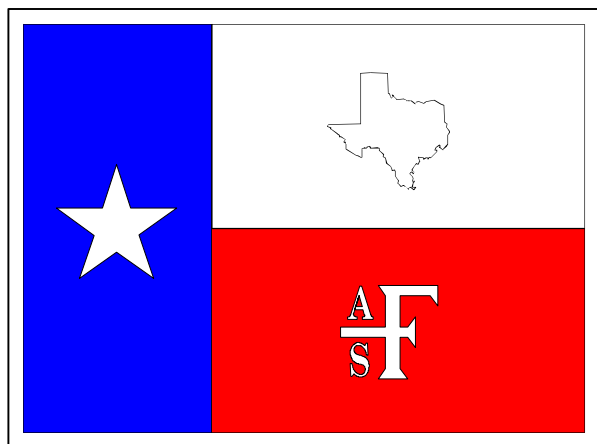

March 16-17 Texas A&M University Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences/Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will co-host the first ever STATEWIDE program entitled Bass 101- Managing Ponds and Lakes for Better Bass Fishing. This program targets private pond owners with complete management information on how to manage their ponds, lakes, and reservoirs for better bass fishing. The program will include speakers recognized regionally for the expertise in fish pond management. The program will begin with pond construction and renovation techniques mid-afternoon on Friday the 16th at the Cain Center in Athens. That first day will end at the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center with a tour, social, and panel discussions on improving fishing in ponds and marketing fishing opportunities on private land. Saturday, March 17th will be a full day devoted to presentations by experts on all aspects of managing Texas private waters for better fishing. Included in the topics on Saturday will be water quality, stocking and management strategies, improving existing ponds, aquatic vegetation management, troubleshooting problems, and an ask the experts panel. Pre-registration by March 1, 2001 is \$50 per person and \$75 after March 1 and at the door. Along with the program will be a Trade Show. Exhibitors will also be invited to setup booths in the trade show at a cost of \$200 per booth. Each participant will receive a program proceedings full of pond management information. 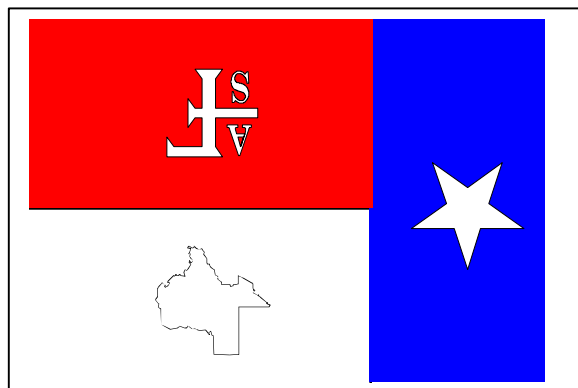
